

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you.

Comm. Crenshaw, if you would review Susan Pramuk versus Housing Opportunities for Comm. Garcia, which brings us to the Administrative Update and the Deputy Director.

MR. BREWSTER: Yes. I've just -- let me see. We will -- we have been attempting -- well, we have been doing outreach to the Burmese population in Fort Wayne. That's somewhat related to our MOU with the Indiana Housing Community Development Authority. They were charged with making those efforts, and so we're assisting in that.

We've had several meetings with the advocacy group for that community in Fort Wayne, and we're also going to be going up to Fort Wayne next week for the annual conference of the Consortium of State and Local Human Rights

Commissions, at which we will also be doing a little bit of outreach to the Burmese population. We will also be conducting a CLE on Thursday in cooperation with the EEOC and the South Bend Human Rights Commission.

Actually, there's --

MR. LANGE: South Bend, too?

MR. BREWSTER: Yeah, South Bend -- an attorney from the South Bend Commission is going to present at that CLE. Let's see if we have another coming up. Our next CLE will be in August, I believe, in Bloomington, and then, as we had planned earlier this year, we'll do another one I believe we're doing in Evansville in October, and then one back here in December.

And that's about all I have at this time.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Do you know what the subject of the CLE in Bloomington will be?

MR. BREWSTER: In Bloomington, it was something to do with summary judgment.

Is that right?

MR. LANGE: Yeah, pending summary judgment. It's lawyer talk.

1 MR. BREWSTER: Yeah. And then I 2 think in Evansville, we were going to do 3 something about employment, employment law, and then back here, we're doing ethics in December, 4 5 so --6 COMM. CRENSHAW: Is there a fee for 7 the one in Evansville? 8 MR. BREWSTER: Yes, I believe we're 9 charging \$50 for all of our CLE's --10 COMM. CRENSHAW: Okay. 11 MR. BREWSTER: -- which is pretty good. It's about half of the going rate for 12 13 CLE's, so we've done pretty well. And we've also 14 been working with the Indiana Continuing Legal 15 Education Foundation, who has been willing to do 16 e-mails for us. They have quite an e-mail list and we get a lot of attendees from that, so 17 18 that's pretty good. 19 COMM. CRENSHAW: Is it only for 20 attorneys, or can --21 MR. BREWSTER: Anybody can come. 22 COMM. CRENSHAW: Okay. Could you 23 e-mail me the information? I would like to take

it back to --

MR. BREWSTER: Sure.

(Discussion off the record.)

MR. BREWSTER: All right.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Is there a large Burmese population in Fort Wayne?

MR. BREWSTER: Yeah, it's actually -Indianapolis, and I don't which is -- for a while
Fort Wayne was the second-largest Burmese
population outside of Burma.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Hmm.

MR. BREWSTER: Indianapolis may have overtaken that now. There's a very large community on the south side of Indianapolis that we're going to start reaching out to as well, just really, you know, letting them know about rights as far as housing. Primarily we're talking about housing, also some education issues.

I know in Fort Wayne they've had a pretty good relationship with the Fort Wayne Human Rights Commission there. There was an incident a couple of years ago in a laundromat where the

proprietor put up a sign that basically said, "No Burmese allowed."

It had something to do with their spitting on the floor. They chew -- what's it called -- some type of tobacco or product that kind of is messy, and that was a problem, but obviously he went a little too far in excluding the whole population.

So, they handled that, the Fort Wayne

Commission, and they got that resolved and -- but

there's another -- an issue up there also with

the school system. I don't know -- we've talked

about that here before, the East Allen County

School System closing the Paul Harding High

School up there and moving all of the students to

other high schools in the district. We had a

complaint filed by many parents.

That high school is also home to almost all of the Burmese. They are -- allegedly there was a decision made by the district some years ago that they were going to basically put all of the Burmese in this one school so that they could better -- you know, they thought it would be more

efficient to --

COMM. CRENSHAW: I guess that's -MR. BREWSTER: -- provide them
services if they were all together. Now, that's
outside of Fort Wayne Human Rights Commission's
jurisdiction, so that's where we kind of come in,
to try to fill that gap there with regard to the
education issue, so --

CHAIRMAN CARTER: It sort of seems unusual that there might be some preconception about a population as exotic and un-Hoosier, as far from Hoosierdom, but I suppose if there's a sudden influx of any group of people, it's going to create --

MR. BREWSTER: Right.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: -- a reaction of some type.

MR. BREWSTER: Right, right, yeah, it's not unexpected, I guess. So far we haven't -- I haven't heard of any problems on the south side, but, you know, I wouldn't be surprised if there were issues that we just haven't heard about yet down there. I'm not sure

where they are residing as far as apartment 2 communities. 3 I know there's a local advocacy group here called Exodus that provides -- they go around and 4 furnish apartments. They receive donations and 5 furnish apartments for these refugees and provide 6 7 other services like that. 8 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Is Burma now called 9 mean March. 10 MR. BREWSTER: Yes, uh-huh. 11 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Okay. Any other questions? 12 13 COMM. RAMOS: How goes the coalition working with the other civil rights groups? I 14 15 know it was a major focus for --16 MR. BREWSTER: Yeah. 17 COMM. RAMOS: -- Commission. 18 MR. BREWSTER: You know, it's been difficult, I'll say. You know, at the beginning 19 of the year, we -- well, actually we started last 20 21 year --22 COMM. RAMOS: Uh-huh. 23 MR. BREWSTER: -- driving around and

meeting with the different directors, then at the beginning of this year we kind of drafted some MOU's to kind of formalize relationships. We haven't received a very positive response from that. I think we've had a couple of the agencies, Terre Haute and Bloomington, I believe, were the only ones that have actually signed the MOU.

б

You know, I don't know what it's -- I know Lafayette has been accepting of it. They haven't signed it yet, but they're interested in the idea of us working with them. I'm not sure. It seems to me there's some turf issues, some concern that we're trying to pre-empt or, you know, take over their territory --

COMM. RAMOS: Uh-huh.

MR. BREWSTER: -- or something, which is not at all the intent. Our intent all along, and I think we've made this pretty clear, is we want to kind of expand it beyond their jurisdictional boundaries and help reach those people that may lie right outside of Fort Wayne or South Bend or Evans -- well, Evansville is

county-wide, so they don't have that similar issue.

But yeah, definitely we haven't -- we continue to push. We met with Richmond last -- or actually Monday. A couple of our staff went over and met with Richmond. Richmond, as you may recall, was defunded, so they don't do a whole lot, although their director is still, I understand, showing up and doing some things, but we're trying, again, to help where we can with that situation.

And I'm trying to think of -
Bloomington's being doing -- like I said, it's

been good to work with them. That's about all

we've -- all we've seen out of that, but again,

we're still trying to meet with these people.

And Columbus, I think, has been receptive. They

have a new director now down in Columbus that

we're trying to reach out to, so --

COMM. RAMOS: On a national level, have there been other programs? Because I know there was a fair amount of connection previously with -- on the national levels -- with the

Executive Director attending some of the 2 conferences and stuff. MR. BREWSTER: Yeah, we did renew our 3 membership with the International Association of 4 Human Rights Workers, and I believe they have a 5 conference coming up this summer or fall. I'm 6 assuming we will send somebody. I don't know if 7 it will be the Director or who, but yeah, we try 8 to maintain those ties as well. 9 COMM. RAMOS: Good. 10 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Any other 11 questions? 12 13 (No response.) CHAIRMAN CARTER: Okay. If you would 14 observe the dates of upcoming meetings, and do we 15 have things to sign? 16 MS. CATALAN: Yes, sir. 17 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Yes. Okay. 18 have things to sign, so if you'd stay for that, 19 that would be --20 MR. LANGE: Lots of them. 21 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Huh? 22 MR. LANGE: Lots of them. 23
