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11:09 o'clock a.m. 1 February 28, 2014 2 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Good morning. 3 The Indiana Civil Rights Commission is in public 4 meeting, and we are in full complement of 5 Commissioners this morning, even in such cold 6 weather. 7 You have the minutes, and I would like a 8 motion to approve the minutes. 9 COMM. MS. COOK: Good morning. You've had an opportunity to review the previous month's Financial Report, and there's been no significant changes. If you have any questions regarding the report, I'd like to go ahead and entertain those at this time.

Before we tackle Old Business, we do have a couple of interested parties who would like to make statements before the Commission. Would you come to the microphone at the podium? I will certainly allow five minutes for each speaker.

And you are?

MS. MCGEE: My name is Jana McGee.

I'm here because you're reviewing my fair housing case.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Could you speak a little louder?

MS. MCGEE: Yeah, I'm sorry. I'm here because you're reviewing my fair housing case today, and I understand a final judgment is being handed down today. I just wanted to make a few statements about that.

I've been in a situation where I've had -I've had neighbors who have been very vocal in
their dislike of me and my need for accommodation
and have used my disabilities to -- anything I've
said as to my disability, they've used as
retaliation against me. I tried to get my
homeowners association to help, which is -- but
they have refused to help me.

I'm sorry if I'm not being very articulate. I understand that this is the final decision, and if it's upheld with the no probable cause, which was what the decision was before, it leaves my neighbors free to retaliate against me as much as they want to, using the chemicals and paints, and --

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I need you to please speak --

MS. MCGEE: Oh, are you --

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- into the microphone.

MS. MCGEE: Oh, are you not hearing me? I'm sorry. I'm not experienced with speaking into a microphone. I'm afraid that I'll be talking too loud.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: No, don't worry.

MS. MCGEE: Okay. And so, if it's -I have tried in every way possible to get
accommodation, because the paints and chemicals
that they use, my doctor has said are not -there is no paint and chemical that's safe for
me, and I believe I've being discriminated
against, because any help I ask for from the HOA
to help accommodate me with they, they refuse me,
even a phone number to contact the landlords, the
owners of this property initially, when I first
started having problems with my neighbors.

And the reason I'm worried about if you uphold it with a finding of no probable cause would be that then I would have no protection against any retaliation that my neighbors want to

make against me for complaining about my disabilities. And there's a year-and-a-half pattern of anything I've tried to get stopped or fixed because it was triggering my disabilities, actually got worse and more extreme.

So, I just wanted to make this statement, that I know that they had said that the chemicals they were using were considered safe for the general public, but if you have multiple chemical sensitivity, there are many things that are safe for the general public that aren't safe for you. For example, perfume or dryer sheets. I can't use dryer sheets. I can't sleep on sheets that have dryer sheets.

So, just because they're using paints that are maybe certified as safe for the general public doesn't mean that they're safe for me, and certainly doesn't mean that people without any medical training have a right to decide for me what's safe for me, and that would be my neighbors or the homeowners association board.

My doctor provided me with certification that said that I should -- I need absolute

avoidance of all of those types of fumes, and I'm not asking that my neighbors move or disrupt their life. I just want them to do their crafts outside so that it isn't in the air space inside the building and coming into my unit.

Those units are very closely connected, they're narrow, they share attic space, they're not well insulated, so fumes will come over to my apartment for days at a time sometimes, and all I'm asking is not for them to disrupt their lives, but not for me to disrupt my life either.

There have been times when I have been driven out of my home into hotels. I've subletted [sic] rooms in apartments with other students to have a place to sleep, because I have no place to sleep when those -- I have the choice of either leaving my home and trying to find another place to stay or sleeping in my house and being exposed to something that my doctor says is dangerous for me.

So, all I had asked is that they do their crafts outside and show some respect for me as someone with a disability, and all I had asked is

that the HOA respect that, and they said that neatness was more important -- outdoor neatness was more important than my health, although they don't seem to be bothered when other people -- or other unit owners are sloppy or do their crafts outside. They do allow other people to do that.

And let's see. The final thing that I wanted to say is that I have seen other people do crafts outside, and -- oh, that no -- there is no one in my homeowners association who even lives in my building, so they are asking me to be exposed to things that they themselves are not having to be exposed to. No -- none of them have to endure that, and none of them have any health issues or health concerns either.

So, I would just -- I think that's the end of my time, and I thank you for being willing to listen to me this morning. Thank you very much.

1 So, you did not have it in your packet 2 prior to the meeting. I'm glad you've had an 3 opportunity to review it for today's meeting, but that was the only agreement that we've had. 4 5 was in the last minute. 6 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Do you 7 require some reversal action in that we have 8 accepted? 9 MS. ALLEN: So, whenever the No. 10 parties agree, or come to some agreement, the parties will send in a joint motion to dismiss. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: So, it's 13 simply dismissed? 14 MS. ALLEN: I'm sorry? 15 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: So, it was simply dismissed? 16 17 MS. ALLEN: Absolutely. CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Thank you. 18 19 MS. ALLEN: Thank you. 20 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: And now, an 21 Administrative Update from our Executive 22 Director. MR. SMITH: Well, good morning slash 23

afternoon, all.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Good morning.

COMM. CRENSHAW: Good morning.

MR. SMITH: Very quick today, not much to report. One of the big things to keep in mind is, of course, we are in April and approaching -- or I'm sorry -- we are in March, approaching April, which is Fair Housing Month, in which we will be having our Fair Housing Conference here at the Government Center.

We think we will be occupying a majority of all of the space here in Government Center South, so excited about that piece. More information to come. Regis -- the up -- not the update, the application -- or the registration is up on-line, so feel free to jump on-line. It is free, with the exception of attorneys seeking CLE credit, and that is a \$35 fee for those seeking that \$35 credit, but free otherwise to the general public. Excited about that piece.

Other things to note is we met recently with the U.S. Attorneys Office, with the idea of exploring possible collaboration for partnerships

between the two agencies. One of the concepts there is that obviously we're governed by the Indiana Civil Rights Law, which has some jurisdictional limitations as it relates to what they oversee.

It doesn't excuse the fact that we get complaints, if you will, that come into the office from constituents in Indiana, asking us to either investigate or look into, if you will, cases that we do not have jurisdiction over. So, such relationship would allow us to, at a minimum, refer such cases to an agency that could actually look into some of these issues, some of them, for example, with law enforcement, which is one of the more common ones that we get that we do not have jurisdiction over.

So, we're excited about that idea. We'll continue to explore that partnership, or the possibility of that partnership, and we'll keep the Commission abreast of how that thing develops.

So, a few of our outreach and marketing pieces, as you well know, our deputy in charge of

External Affairs, Daniel Lopez, moved on. That doesn't mean our outreach and marketing efforts cease, so we have a full-blown campaign -- some of you may have heard in your area some radio spots moving.

Now there's a bus in transportation outlets or spots that you should see as well.

Billboards will be coming soon, and that is an extension of the insert in our strategic plan that involves the branding of the outreach. So, looking forward to that. Would love to get all directed comments from the Commission as you see those things arise, the good, the bad, the ugly, to let us know so that we can continue to improve in that area as well.

Some of the on-line efforts that we have, as many of you are aware, we have the One Indiana show, which is a broadcast that we put together. Yours truly has hosted the last two, at least until we get a permanent fill-in for that. Still going very, very well. We promote, obviously, Fair Housing Month as well as March being Women -- am I getting that --

MS. ALLEN: History.

MR. SMITH: Women's History Month, as well as Disability Awareness Month, so we have the Back Home in Indiana -- or Back Home Alliance in Indiana, their own show, as well as our own Kristin Garvey, who is the Director of the Women's Commission, so we're excited about that.

So, we will be exploring a permanent host for One Indiana, because I'm not sure that I'm the right fit for hosting that show. So, excited about that, though, and we are getting a lot of good reviews for that YouTube channel, a lot of good feedback, especially from a lot of the grassroot community organizations, because they feed that and patch that through to their members, and so we're excited about that piece.

Outside of that, the Commission and the agency is moving right along. We're excited about a lot of what we have going on in the spring and summer. Hope -- as we travel, please take a look at the agenda, as we've mapped that out all of the way through September, actually all of the way through November and December with

the CLE's. 1 2 So, as we are in your neck of the woods, I 3 encourage you to come out and be involved. 4 there's anything that we can do that you guys see in your respective communities that we are not 5 6 doing, please let us know that as well. 7 So, with that, that ends the Director's Report, unless there are any questions or 8 9 concerns from the Commission. (No response.) 10 MR. SMITH: Very good. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Fine job. 13 Thank you. 14 MR. SMITH: Thank you. 15 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Do we have 16 any announcements? 17 (No response.) CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: 18 19 announcements? 20 (No response.) 21 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: The only 22 announcement today has been everyone is sick of 23 winter.

CARTER: Well, we can look 8 forward to fresh snow. 9 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: We have to 10 look forward to fresh snow, and then an early -if not early, even spring sometime. 11 So, thank you for that. 12 13 COMM. BAYNARD: I've got a question. 14 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Yes. 15 COMM. BAYNARD: I've noticed that the Bridgewater versus FACES case that originated 16 17 here in this Commission is still ongoing. Are we tracking that, or is it something that we're 18 going to hear about later on? I notice it's 19 going to -- I think it's got a stop at the 20 21 Indiana Supreme Court. 22 MR. SMITH: Well, it is technically 23 out of our hands. We are tracking, if for

nothing else, that we have a sincere interest in how that thing develops, because we invested a 2 3 lot as an agency, and a lot of the folks on staff 4 invested a lot of, you know, personal energy into 5 that case. So, we are tracking that, and 6 interested to see how the Court moves -- or rules on that. So, stay tuned. We update or put the 7 information, updated information, about that case 8 as it moves along on the Web site, so --9 10 COMM. BAYNARD: Okay. 11 MR. SMITH: -- periodically check back on the Web site and see how that's evolving. 12 13 COMM. BAYNARD: Is there a date for 14 the hearing? 15 MR. SMITH: That, I'm not sure. 16 MS. ALLEN: The hearing has already occurred --17 18 COMM. BAYNARD: Okay. 19 MS. ALLEN: -- and we will await a decision. 20 21 MR. SMITH: A decision. 22 COMM. BAYNARD: All right. Thank 23 you.

1 MR. SMITH: I think we're very much 2 interested as well in that decision. We'll be 3 kind of tossed out all over the place on that, in 4 that case, so yeah. 5 COMM. BAYNARD: Thank you. 6 MR. SMITH: Yes, sir. 7 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: We don't 8 promise you easy cases. We're just trying to 9 help the people. 10 MR. SMITH: That's right. CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: All right. 11 Are there any other questions or 12 13 announcements? 14 (No response.) 15 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Hearing none, 16 this meeting is adjourned. 17 MR. SMITH: Thank you. 18 Thereupon, the proceedings of 19 February 28, 2014 were concluded at 11:33 o'clock a.m. 20 21 22 23
