COMM. CARTER: Good morning, it still is. The July meeting of the Indiana Civil Rights Commission will come to order. The first item on the agenda is the chair convenes a meeting and then establishes a quorum, which we do not have, once again.

So we won't be able to vote on voting matters, but we will go through the agenda in any case. We can't approve of the minutes. We can, however, listen to Joan Essex when she gives the financial report.

MS. ESSEX: Good morning. This is going to be really short and sweet. We came through the end of the 2008-2009 fiscal year very well. The Budget Agency and the powers that be had asked that we revert back to the general fund \$310,000. We actually gave them back \$310,610. And I was just telling the Director if I could have found another invoice to put through against that \$600, I would have done so.

We did meet our mark, and we are happy to do so. And we are now in new money. We do have a new budget. And this year the reversion target is

1	currently 5 percent. There are no indications that
2	that percentage rate will increase, but, again, it
3	just depends on what the economy does, and we will
4	know as the year progresses.
5	So I'll take any questions you have on the
6	financial statement if you have any.
7	COMM. CARTER: Any questions?
8	(No response.)
9	COMM. CARTER: All right. Thank you,
10	Ms. Essex.
11	Old business. Ms. Ray, is she here? Did you
12	want to address the Commission?
13	MS. RAY: Yes, I did.
14	COMM. CARTER: Please do so.
15	MS. RAY: I just have some questions with a
16	case Twanna Ray v. Princeton Lake Apartments, how
17	the handling of the case was performed, because I
18	was not notified that the case was dismissed,
19	No. 1.
20	And what constitutes discrimination? I mean,
21	can you ask someone for their race when applying
22	for an apartment complex or any housing?
23	COMM. CARTER: I'm not familiar with the case,
24	and I'm not a lawyer, but we have people perhaps
25	who are both familiar and lawyers.

Would someone care to speak to that?

MR. BREWSTER: Ms. Ray, I'm somewhat familiar with the case. I was just given the actual file this morning. And I see that you were sent a notice of no reasonable cause in your case back in September of 2008. And it's indicated that you did receive that notice of our finding. And that you did appeal that finding within the 15 days that you were allowed to appeal.

That appeal was entertained by this commission at some point between September and December. And a decision was entered by the Commission upholding the finding in December of 2008.

While I understand there was some mixup with the postal service --

MS. RAY: Correct.

MR. BREWSTER: -- and you did not receive notice of the date and time -- place of the hearing, or I should say the public commission meeting, I will say that it is not our normal procedures to inform complainants of that.

MS. RAY: I called, and I did -- let me interject. I did call the office several times to get posted on this, and nobody seemed to know.

They just kept telling me it's going to be a long

1 time, just wait, be patient. 2 MR. BREWSTER: Okay. But it is my 3 understanding you were informed of the date and 4 place of the Commission meeting at some point? 5 MS. RAY: No, I was not. 6 MR. BREWSTER: Okay. Well, I understand, 7 though, previously you have -- you have had a case 8 previous to this; did you not? 9 MS. RAY: Uh-huh, that's correct. 10 MR. BREWSTER: And you did attend the public 11 meeting? 12 MS. RAY: I did. 13 MR. BREWSTER: So I'm not sure what the mixup 14 was about not knowing when the meeting was. And if 1.5 we failed to inform you of that, we apologize for 16 that. 17 MS. RAY: Yeah, because I did send in a change 18 of address, which was stamped up by your office. 19 And it ended up going to a Travis Ray in Beech 20 And I obtained the certified copy 21 information from the post office that that's what 22 happened. 23 So, no, I did not get informed. And I'm just 24 curious as to why I've been routed through so many

people, you know. I tried to get Tony Kirkland to

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Call me back. I left a message with his secretary

Paula. I've spoken with Ms. Poindexter. I've

spoken with Michael Johnson, Melissa Dearing. I

mean, how many people does it take to get an

answer?

MR. BREWSTER: Well, you understand that during the time this was occurring, there were several changes in position. Melissa Dearing went from being an investigator to an intake supervisor.

MS. RAY: Okay.

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MR. BREWSTER: Michael Johnson, while I understand he originally took your complaint, he was not investigating the complaint.

Henrietta Poindexter is the supervisor of the housing unit. That's probably why you spoke with her.

I understand you spoke with Barbara Malone.

She was the deputy director, she no longer is. And Paula is the executive assistant for our Director,

Tony Kirkland.

I don't know why you were not told of when and where the Commission meeting would be held, but I will reiterate that it is not our normal policy to inform complainants of that time and date. If it is requested, again, I don't know why it wasn't.

1 Sometimes we don't have forums. 2 MS. RAY: Okay. 3 MR. BREWSTER: So, you know, we might not have 4 the meeting. 5 MS. RAY: Right. You might not have it that 6 month, right. 7 MR. BREWSTER: It might get changed. I don't 8 know why you weren't told the specific date and 9 place of the hearing. 10 I've even spoken with Cynthia Hayes, MS. RAY: 11 Barbara Malone. I mean, this just goes to show how 12 many people that I've called to just get this 13 information. 14 MR. BREWSTER: Right. But in regard to your 1.5 previous question, or your other question about 16 whether or not it is okay to ask the race on an 17 application for rental, yes, it is. That is not in 18 violation of the Civil Rights Law. 19 MS. RAY: You can ask someone's race? 20 thought it was against the law. I thought you guys 21 had commercials on TV that even say you cannot ask. 22 MR. BREWSTER: It's not against the law to 23 It would be against the law for them to deny 24 you rental because of your race, but it's not 25 against the law to ask. In fact, it's required by

some federal laws to keep information such as that.

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MS. RAY: So if there is a form that's saying it's optional, and I check optional, and when I take the application back I'm told I can't turn it in because I didn't check my race, then they don't process it, that's what happened here.

MR. BREWSTER: I don't know. I can't get into your case. We're not here to re-hear the facts of your case. All I can say is I apologize that you didn't have an opportunity to be here in person to appeal your case. But do know that one of these commissioners, or maybe one of the other four that aren't here, did take this case and review it and determined that they would uphold the finding of the Agency.

That's all I can say about your case in particular.

MS. RAY: Okay. So what can we get into today? What type of questions can I ask you, then?

MR. BREWSTER: What question? Go ahead. What question do you have, and I'll tell you if I can answer it.

MS. RAY: What is the normal procedure for, you know, filing an application, because they sent it off to -- the assistant manager is the main

1 person that dealt with it. And then it got sent to 2 the leasing agent for approval, which to me is 3 backwards. 4 MR. BREWSTER: Well, let me put it this way, 5 Ms. Ray, if you have questions about these general 6 procedures of processing applications, it would 7 probably be better that we discuss that after this 8 meeting. 9 MS. RAY: Okay. 10 MR. BREWSTER: I would welcome you to come 11 back to my office, and we can discuss that. 12 purpose here is for you to address the Commission 13 with any questions you have about the appeal. 14 MS. RAY: Okay. Well, who did the final 15 investigation report? Who came up with that? 16 MR. BREWSTER: It would have been your 17 investigator. 18 MS. RAY: Melissa? 19 MR. BREWSTER: I assume that's who was the 20 investigator, I'm not sure. Yes, it was signed 21 Melissa Dearing. So I assume she did that. 22 MS. RAY: Is there a certain criteria that you 23 guys follow? Do you just get the paperwork and file --24 25 MR. BREWSTER: Ms. Ray, if you want to discuss

that, we can discuss that after. 1 2 MS. RAY: Sure. 3 MR. BREWSTER: We have the commissioners here, 4 and their time is limited today. 5 MS. RAY: Okay. 6 MR. BREWSTER: So if you have any questions 7 for the commissioners, then go ahead and ask them. 8 MS. RAY: Sure, we'll take it out. Nope, 9 that's it. I'll talk to you in private. 10 MR. BREWSTER: Okay. 11 COMM. CARTER: Thank you for coming in. I'm 12 glad you made it to one of our meetings. 13 MS. RAY: Thank you for inviting me. 14 COMM. CARTER: There is nothing listed under 15 new business. And we can't vote on consent 16 agreements, nor can we vote on findings of fact, 17 etc., nor the complainant appeals. 18 Can we assign -- no, we can't even assign 19 appeals. 20 MR. LANGE: Yeah, I think you can. 21 something the chair does. It's not only the 22 Commission that signs. 23 COMM. CARTER: Okay. 24 MR. LANGE: You in her stead will sign. 25 COMM. CARTER: Well, I don't, since there are

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so few of us, I don't think it's fair to us to try to take the whole slate. I already have two assigned to me, Watkins v. Ivy Tech and Rafia, M.D. v. IUPUI Police. And I will take those.

v. Griswold Estates Management, that's all one thing.

And Commissioner Crenshaw, Gonzales v. CVS

Pharmacy. Well, also, I guess Millman v. Indiana

Horse Racing.

Commissioner Gidney -- I think we can, might be able to do the whole slate. Commissioner Gidney, if you would take the one that's assigned to you here, Lee v. Tool Dynamics, plus Garcia Boggs v. Sherie Proctor, David Fisher, DSI Properties and Williams v. Belgarde Property Services, Inc.

And I will take in addition to the ones I've said, Jefferson, Blackburn, Gordon v. Your Friends and Neighbors, and Palma v. Kesler Schaefer Auto Auction, and hope I can carry all those. Which brings us to the administrative update.

MR. KIRKLAND: Okay. Commissioners, we've been real busy here over the last couple of weeks making some definite changes.

One, let me give you some reorg changes.

Currently right now, Joshua Brewster will serve as the new deputy director for our department.

I also have here with us a new ADR person,

Ms. Ruby Bowman. Ruby comes from state personnel,

so she's going to be on the team.

We also have in the audience with us our interns. If you would stand, please. David Hall, Dianna, Kelly and Jacob. And we do have one more, Ashley, who's not here with us today. So that's some of the things that we're doing.

Of course, we attended, some of the staff did attend the Human Relations statewide conference in Evansville. I attended, along with another staff member, Marco Deckard, went to Baltimore to keep a contract where we signed contracts that were related to our EEOC contract. And I leave Sunday for the required EEOC Excel Conference, which is going to be held in New Orleans.

So with that on the agenda, we have our plate full. We still are generating cases. The mediation department is -- I think if you all don't have, you should have a copy of the report. I didn't review, but I think that you will see some of the progression that we are making.

Next month you will have an operation report, which I'll be submitting, will kindly give all the commissioners a brief update of things we've done, things that we're looking forward to doing to complete the rest of the year.

COMM. CARTER: Is that it? Okay. Thank you. And are there any other announcements besides the next dates, August 28, September 25 and October 23rd? Does anyone else have anything?

I'll just mention that on, I believe it's next
Tuesday in Bloomington, we're going to have one of
two trainings. The first one is for inspectors,
state inspectors, building inspectors and other
people involved in code enforcement for
accessibility. And then the one -- there's one in
August, in mid-August, for people in the building
trades and real estate having to do with
accessibility and instruction and that.

And they are going to be given by the Great Lakes DBTAC, what is it, Disability Business Training something.

MR. LANGE: Something Council.

COMM. CARTER: They're federally funded to know about the ADA. And Robin Jones is the executive director there, and she's very good. She

1 knows -- if anyone knows everything about the ADA, 2 she's the one. So that ought to be useful. 3 We learned years ago that a problem with 4 getting a new business, say, that opens in a 5 community inspected as to whether they're 6 accessible or not, is that the building inspectors 7 are employees of the local government. They're 8 supposed to enforce the Building Code, the Indiana 9 Build Code, but they are not agents of the Building 10 Commission. And, consequently, there's a wild 11 degree of training or lack of training from one 12 inspector to the next. 13

And so we thought this would be kind of a proactive way of rather than going in and penalizing the business owner after the fact, get the people who are supposed to be doing it to do their job properly.

Anyone else have a comment? (No response.)

COMM. CARTER: If not, we can adjourn. I would hear a motion to adjourn if one were made.

COMM. GIDNEY: So moved.

COMM. CARTER: Okay. That adjourns us.
