RAMOS: Are there any stimulus dollars or anything related to that at all? 16 17 MS. ESSEX: There is no stimulus dollars that have been set aside for Civil Rights 18 19 at all, so --20 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Okay. MR. KIRKLAND: Well, good morning, Commissioners.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Good morning.

MR. KIRKLAND: We've been pretty busy doing quite a few things around the agency. One, we're getting prepared -- HUD is supposed to be in the week of June the 10th for our audit, the year -- the annual audit that they do with us, so we're looking forward to them coming over and checking out the agency, making sure we're staying on track and doing things that we need to do.

We have completed the HUD contract, so

anything that we do currently right now is sort of like, might we say, just extra gravy at the time we start back up, so we're doing excellent there.

On our EEOC contract, we are on target and it looks like we're going to probably be ahead with meeting that contract as well. So, in the process, as you know, my Deputy Director has been on family medical leave, and Mr. Joshua Brewster here at the end is serving as our interim Deputy Director so that we can still be able to operate and function, so we'll still get to keep pace and move forward, so we're staying on top of that.

Also, I passed out to all of you all before, before you is our new policy manual that we've given out to the employees there at the Civil Rights, so this will be going forward to them next week, so I just wanted to make sure that you all had a copy of it first so that you all will be well abreast of the standards we have going on here at the agency.

So, as we approach the summer months, some of the things that -- we've had some outreach

going on, and I know that we're going to be tied up extensive with Indiana Black Expo, in particular on the educational side. The U.S.

Department of Education, the new educational director, will be coming in on Thursday to do the educational summit.

So, we look forward to that being a pretty good time for the Civil Rights to have its outreach at its best, and we have anticipated numbers of approximately -- last year was over 600, so we definitely want to have a presence there.

And we do also have several other events that's going to be going on throughout the summer as we lead up to our September Fair Housing Act activity, so we're working trying to put that together as well.

Other than that, we have five interns on board right now. We have two that are currently law students; is that correct, Josh?

MR. BREWSTER: One.

MR. KIRKLAND: Is it two -- there's one law student, and Kelly is -- I think Kelly

is --

MR. BREWSTER: The rest of them are in college. Kelly's planning to go to law school. The rest of them are in college.

MR. KIRKLAND: Right. So, I know one is a poli-sci major, a major in business administration and finance, and one -- Diana is what, accounting?

MS. ESSEX: Accounting major.

MR. KIRKLAND: Accounting major. So, they seem to be pretty much engrossed with the process right now. We have them on a three-week rotation from the different branches of the department so they're getting a full grasp of what the agency does at the end of the summer. They also are required to have several meetings with the Governor from time to time during the summer. He has meetings with all -- they are all Governor's interns, so they will be meeting with him, getting ideas about some of the things that they're doing and how that's supposed to progress.

So, other than that -- is there anything

else? MS. ESSEX: Huh-uh. 2 The next meeting. MR. LANGE: 3 MR. KIRKLAND: Oh, yes. 4 You wanted to talk about MR. LANGE: 5 going to Evansville. 6 MR. KIRKLAND: Yeah, that's -- the 7 challenge, yeah, because I know that's the next 8 agenda item --9 MR. LANGE: Oh, I'm sorry. 10 MR. KIRKLAND: -- so I didn't want to 11 get ahead of myself, but Madam Chair, the 12 challenge is, as we talk about the IAOHRA 13 Conference, one of the things that we wanted to 14 do was try to have our meeting on a Friday on --15 there while the conference is going on. 16 Unfortunately, we know that you're going to be 17 out on that Friday. 18 We could probably still have the meeting. 19 The challenge would be that we wanted you there 20 if possible as the Chair. Because of the way 21 that they have the schedule laid out, pretty much 22 it would be, even if we went to -- say if we did
