10:30 a.m. 1 November 20, 2009 2 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Good morning. Indiana Civil Rights Commission is now in 4 public meeting, and having established a quorum, you have some minutes to approve that 6 we need to approve. May I have a motion to 7 8 approve the minutes? COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: So moved. 10 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: So moved. COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second. 11 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: All in favor? 12 (Unanimous in favor.) 13 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Anyone opposed? 14 15 (None opposed.) CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: We'll move next to 16 17 the financial report then. 18 MS. ESSEX: Good morning. I do not have a 19 financial report in your packet. As some of 20 you may know, we have switched over to a new 21 accounting system, and the information was not 22 available in time to make it into the packet, so we will have two months' financial 23 24 statements in the next -- at the next meeting.

The one thing that I do want to make you

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aware of is I'm sure you've heard the news then that there is a budget crunch or an economic crunch in the State of Indiana, and revenues are down some \$310 million from projections. The governor has asked that agencies who were previously asked to revert five percent of their annual appropriation to now revert 10 percent of that annual appropriation, and we are poised to be able to hit that 10 percent mark.

At the beginning of the year, of the fiscal year in July, we made a conscious decision to try to look at our overall spending with the anticipation that five percent was not going to carry through to the end of the year, so we are still looking at cost-saving measures where we can, things as simple as double siding on our printing, using our main copiers instead of personal copiers that use more ink and cost more money.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Not replacing the toner quickly.

COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: Once you get them streaks.

MS. ESSEX: Yes. So we're doing what we

can, and we will be able to make our 10 1 percent reversion target. Hopefully 10 2 percent is where it stays, but if it isn't, then we will continue to do what we can. if anyone has any questions, I would be glad 5 to take them. 6 COMMISSIONER BAYNARD: Will there be any 7 layoffs because of this? 8 Right now, that has not been 9 MS. ESSEX: I think that everyone has a feeling 10 11

stated. I think that everyone has a feeling that it is possible. We're hoping that -There is a furlough program that has been put into place asking employees to take time off with no pay. Some agencies --

MR. KIRKLAND: They don't want us to use that word, furlough.

MS. ESSEX: Right. I'm sorry.

MR. KIRKLAND: They want us to call it unpaid leave.

MS. ESSEX: Unpaid leave.

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MR. KIRKLAND: Well, as you all know, of course Department of Administration did have a layoff last week, and each agency has been asked to evaluate. We are in the middle of evaluating all the positions that we have.

And as I met with the staff this week to let them know that, you know, as we talk about cost-cutting saving measures, you know, me and Joan and Ruby have been and Josh has been hard at work trying to make sure that we send in a justification according to the stats upon each and everyone's position. Even though with that right now, we hope that we're not asked.

If the layoff does come, it will be from Budget. Budget will be making that determination, you know, because as each agency is looked upon, just like IDOA, IDOA didn't even come up on the radar even though 33 people were laid off. Also, the 33 removed recreates 1.6 million bucks in savings that they needed to get up under the budget.

So Budget is still reviewing everyone's budget and things that we're looking at trying to do. Me and Joan went before the Budget hearing two weeks ago, as we said, with many of the other agencies, and they was grilling the hard questions, okay, what you can live with, what you can live without, justify, you know, some of the things that we might be doing.

One of the things that we are trying to do in doing that, we definitely are trying to get our public awareness campaign back out that we are doing, you know, cases, because if we don't do the public awareness piece, if we don't get enough cases coming in, that starts to affect overall the bottom-line figure for us because that's how we make it, off of EEOC and HUD contracts. So definitely in the EEOC category, we're doing great. In our HUD

MS. ESSEX: And we did just start an advertising, a small advertising campaign with IndyGo buses. That started on the 16th of November, and it will run for about 24 weeks. So we're hoping -- And that is just geared towards housing, so we're hoping that that will bring in some cases from the housing area.

COMMISSIONER BAYNARD: In the past we've done radio and television. Are we doing this that time?

MS. ESSEX: We are not, and the reason being that it is so terribly expensive, and we

just don't have the budget to support that, and we don't have -- In the past when we have run those types of ads on radio and TV, we were fortunate enough to have HUD grant dollars to help us do that. HUD has backed away from the advertising portion because they can't justify those expenditures any longer and putting those out in grants. We do have a Fair Housing Initiative Program grant in with HUD right now through the SuperNOFA. should be hearing something on that I would say hopefully before January. That grant that we submitted was for regional forums to inform people of what housing discrimination is and their rights in foreclosure and different things like that, which is what HUD is gearing more towards now in getting away from the advertisement.

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COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: Well, I hope they'll think about it, because as you said, foreclosure, more and more people are losing their homes.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Yeah.

COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: This is the primary time for a landlord to say, "No, not

you group of people," and if they get away from that --

MS. ESSEX: Well, they're wanting us to basically go out and personally talk to individuals more so than using the airwaves and billboards and different things like that.

COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: So more grass roots.

MS. ESSEX: More grass roots.

COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: So are we looking at maybe doing some of these meetings next year around the state?

MS. ESSEX: If the grant goes through, we have six regional meetings scheduled as well as a housing forum in central Indiana, so the six regional will be in the six -- In fact, there are eight regions in the state. It's laid out through one of the housing partnerships. We even put in our prospectus that we would be willing to do eight and do one in each of the eight regions throughout the state.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: It will be interesting to see how that plays out because it sounds great, but I don't know about the

efficacy of that, of trying to reach people one on one in that way, because we have tried moving our meetings around. It's very difficult to get people with their normal day-to-day schedules to show up for a

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MR. KIRKLAND: Right.

MS. ESSEX: Right.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- even if the information is valuable to them.

MS. ESSEX: And we've struggled with that as well. You think, okay, should we have this in the evening, should we have it on Saturday, should we have it during the week, and people work such different hours, and then there are child care concerns and things as that. it's very difficult to try to find the time when you're assured that you're going to be able to get the most folks, and so we're going to try to do what we can in that area.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: So there's no money for radio, there's no money to show up during the morning show to let people know what the real deal is, which is where they're listening.

1 MS. ESSEX: Right.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: You know, you need to get people where they are.

MS. ESSEX: Right.

MR. KIRKLAND: It's just like, you know, just like with the one case we got with the borough out there. I think we've gotten more popularity here over the last three weeks just in general. Josh was on Amos. I'm on Terri Dee's Sunday morning. You know, but also I'm talking not just about that particular incident. You know, I'm talking about what Civil Rights, what are we doing --

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Exactly.

MR. KIRKLAND: -- things that are needed so when we get these one-on-ones, these opportunities, like you have one shot to try to put out what actually -- what this office does. So that could be a challenge. Then usually you get those callers, but what you want to do, like I was doing Saturday, you go ahead with the concerned clergy because you're trying to explain to them, hey, if there's individuals that's having problems with discrimination in housing as well as in

unemployment, you know, please give our office 1 a call, you know, because you've got to try to 2 go out and drum up business. 3 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Okay, very 5 interesting. Is there any old business? 6 Under new business, we have the meeting scheduled for 2011. It's like Oprah's notice. 7 JUDGE LANGE: Well, we have to get the 8 To get a room this size, we need to have asked for it quite some time ago. 10 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: We have to tease 11 12 you just a little bit for getting these 13 schedules out two years out, but it's helpful. COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Okay. An administrative update, please.

MR. KIRKLAND: Okay. As you all have before you, you do have the monthly production report. As I said, it seemed like we picked up a little bit of spending in the intake area where we're getting a lot of calls. A lot of calls are starting to come in just due to the nature I guess of one particular case, but we hope to continue that. We do have another case as relates to the State Fairgrounds that's starting to brew, so we've got to see how this shapes out. Those are some -- and I've noticing that the phone is steadily ringing.

We also have adjusted the office hours due to the fact that trying to hone in and trying

to make sure that we have -- I guess the best way to put it is that we are being utilized to the best of our ability and making sure that the office is functional. Our office hours have now went from 8:00 to 5:30 where we have shifts that starts from 7:30 to 4:00, and we have individuals that are there till 5:30, so we have some overlapping to make sure that we can be effective and do what we need to do.

The deputy director is pretty much on track with our cases and contracts with EEOC as well as HUD. So we seem to be on target to make those contracts, and right now we seem to be ahead in particular with EEOC. But EEOC, we have the largest number of volume of cases that need to be investigated here. So the average we have, average case load of individuals that's working on the employment side is running about 72 per employee. In our housing unit, we are looking at approximately about 26 per investigator, but of course housing takes a longer time to investigate.

So hopefully with that, we also are -- Our mediation is picking up. We have a contract with the City of Indianapolis. We also have

1 submitted contracts to Bloomington as well as 2 Evansville as well as South Bend because one 3 of the things, the services that we are 4 starting to offer is our mediation. 5 also have a contract with EEOC to do regular 6 mediation, but this is outside, and those dollars are coming again to the agency. 7 They're looking towards the general budget. 8 9 So we had our first case we mediated for the 10 City of Indianapolis what, two weeks ago, 11 which turned out to be a pretty nice, sizable 12 amount that they mediated and settled for. we're really trying to make sure that we get 13 14 an opportunity for individuals to get a chance 15 to mediate a case as opposed to going through 16 And, you know, it works the long process. 17 good when both the complainant and the 18 respondent --19

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: It's a more costly process.

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MR. KIRKLAND: Right. When they realize, okay, we need to come to a happy medium, that works out real good. So hopefully we can keep that going.

Outside the agency functions, we're still

involved with being involved with Project 1 Census. As you know, IDO Commissioner Everson 2 has been assigned to represent the state. 3 We've been assigned to work with Commissioner 4 Everson, Office of Civil Rights, so we're 5 6 trying to work it, see how that layout goes as we try to get the word out about being counted 7 for for the census. So hopefully that is 8 going. And Ruby Bowman is heading that up for us, so I hope that works out pretty good. 10 other than that, that's it. We're staying 11 12 busy. 13 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Is the census activity focused on public information or are 14 15 we actually having people --MR. KIRKLAND: No, public information. 16 17 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Oh, okay. MR. KIRKLAND: No, we're not actually 18 19 doing it. 20 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Counting heads. 21 You're not counting heads? 22 MR. KIRKLAND: No, we're not doing that. 23 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: All right. MR. KIRKLAND: No, we're not doing that. 24 25 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: All right. Very

good.

Are there any announcements? Nothing going on?

MR. KIRKLAND: January 14th, the Martin

Luther King Holiday Commission will be having

the Martin Luther King celebration here at the

State House Rotunda. We'll have -- actually

have for the youth program, which will take

place at 9:00 -- Is that correct?

MS. ESSEX: 9:30.

MR. KIRKLAND: 9:30. And Chelsea Hulleman is the youth speaker. And for the noon day speaker, which will be held at the Rotunda, will be Mayor Young from Philadelphia, Mississippi, so he will be here.

You're supposed to get documentation on Monday he said.

MS. ESSEX: Oh, okay.

MR. KIRKLAND: I talked to him this morning, because he called. So he's looking forward to being here, and I think that will be a great program. I think Joan and the committee have worked hard along with the Martin Luther King Commission to make sure that that works out.

Are you available in particular, Madam Chair? Because I need to get that on your radar.

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I'm going to put it on my radar right now.

MR. KIRKLAND: Well, you know, because I know he told me this morning that he talked with people at CNN, and he was asking for his schedule layout, so he told me he's supposed to be here in Indianapolis. So, you know, if he's -- if CNN is following him around on the first year of the elections, you know the magnitude of it.

For those that don't know, Philadelphia, Mississippi, was the heat of one of the places where the civil rights was at an all-time high, also the same place where the three civil rights workers were killed. And Philadelphia made history this year with the first black mayor, and I guess, yes, they had other towns in Mississippi with black mayors, but the thought of Philadelphia, Mississippi, having one is like a long shot, you know. And the other thing I'm excited about is me being from that area, it's exciting, so.

MS. ESSEX: And the youth summit or the 1 youth educational piece will be at the state 2 3 museum from 9:30 to 11:30, 12:00 at the very 4 latest, and then the Rotunda is strictly the 5 state employee celebration, and that will run from 12:30 to 1:30. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: What time do you 8 want us there? And do you have a part for me 9 to play or you just want me to be there? 10 MR. KIRKLAND: Strongly, it could be. 11 There may be some photo ops with the governor 12 and you. That's the reason why I was asking, 13 and if the CNN guys show up, you know. MS. ESSEX: So I would say be there 12:00, 14 15 quarter till. 16 MR. KIRKLAND: Yeah, quarter till. 17 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Okay. 18 MS. ESSEX: And we'll be sending invitations out, formal invitations out to 19 20 everyone. After the Thanksgiving holiday, 21 those will go out. 22 MR. KIRKLAND: Yeah. So we'll have all 23 the legislators as well, invitations going to 24 them as well as the city council.

5	MS. ESSEX: Really?

8	CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: No, but that's
9	good.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Philadelphia,
11	Mississippi, is a big deal.
12	MS. ESSEX: If he's in Bloomington, he
13	might want to come to this event.
14	MR. KIRKLAND: You know the day that they
15	announced it?
16	COMMISSIONER CARTER: No. I just saw the
17	headline as I was leaving the house. As I
18	said, visibility was bad.
19	MR. KIRKLAND: That's true, yeah.
20	CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: You just tell
21	Jesse CNN is going to be here, and he'll be.
22	MR. KIRKLAND: That's exactly what I was
23	going to say. I'm glad you said that because
24	that's what I was thinking.
25	COMMISSIONER CRENSHAW: That's still out

of line. 1 MR. KIRKLAND: That's what I was just 3 thinking. It's strange, like you're reading my mind, all you got to do is tell him CNN is 5 here, you know, he'll bounce right in.
