And we do have a quorum. 6 7 In fact, we have everyone but our Chairperson, who is announced for being late -- to be late. 8 Where is the agenda? 9 COMM. RAMOS: Here. 10 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Oh, thank you. 11 have had an opportunity to review the minutes. 12 May I have a motion --13 14 COMM. GIDNEY: So moved. CHAIRMAN CARTER: -- to accept? 15 second? 16 17 COMM. RAMOS: Second. CHAIRMAN CARTER: All in favor? 18 COMM. GARCIA: Aye. 19 COMM. CRENSHAW: Aye. 20 COMM. BAYNARD: 21 Aye. COMM. RAMOS: 22 Aye. 23 COMM. GIDNEY: Aye.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Any opposed? 2 (No response.) 3 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you. And thus to Ms. Cook and the Financial 4 Report. 5 MS. COOK: Good morning. 6 7 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Good morning. COMM. CRENSHAW: Good morning. 8 MS. COOK: You've had a chance to 9 review the September Financial Report in your 10 11 packet. There are no new changes. If you have 12 any questions, I'd like to entertain those at this point in time. 13 14 CHAIRMAN CARTER: I missed it when I was reading the minutes. I note I missed either 15 last month or the month before --16 17 MS. COOK: Uh-huh. CHAIRMAN CARTER: -- Alpha said, "Ah, 18 you -- you got the trick; the less you say, the 19 fewer questions there are. That was pretty good. 20 Are there any questions? 21 COMM. GIDNEY: No. 22 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Hearing none, we 23

will move on to Old Business. Reports by 2 Commissioners on Complaint Appeals. 3 Comm. Crenshaw? COMM. CRENSHAW: 4 Okay. In the case 5 of Pamela Singleton versus Wal-Mart, and also the 6 case of Phillip Jefferson versus GreatCare as 7 well as Pamela Kidd versus Employment Plus, Inc., I would like to make a recommendation we uphold 8 9 the Deputy Director's finding of no probable 10 cause. In the Phillip Jefferson versus 11 GreatCare, I have someone -- part of someone else's file. 12 13 MR. LANGE: That was Phillip Jefferson? 14 15 COMM. CRENSHAW: Uh-huh. So, I think 16 I ought to let you know that. 17 MR. LANGE: Okay. Who -- what -whose case is that? 18 19 COMM. CRENSHAW: It is Brian Tremble 20 versus Affiliated Computer Services. 21 MR. LANGE: It does not mean anything 22 to me, but we'll look into it. 23 MR. SMITH: Okay. If I will, Paula,

make a note to do a cross-reference from last 2 week's piece to overlook -- to see if that case was actually listed on that docket, and if so, 3 4 who should have had it, and so we make sure we 5 get to the bottom of why that popped up. 6 Sorry about that, Comm. Crenshaw. 7 COMM. CRENSHAW: No problem. 8 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Did you have a Pamela Kidd? Is that --9 10 COMM. CRENSHAW: Yes. 11 CHAIRMAN CARTER: You had --12 COMM. CRENSHAW: I have --13 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Did you say about 14 that, or do you want to --15 COMM. CRENSHAW: Yeah, all three, I'd 16 like make a recommendation to uphold the Deputy 17 Director's finding of no probable cause. Crenshaw, if you would review Debra White and Heart of CarDon, LLC, and 4 5 Rosalind Cammack versus Lincoln Life; Comm. Gidney, if you would look at Lisa Dipert 6 7 versus St. Joseph County Juvenile Center, and there's an "and" that's dangling there, but no 8 9 additional stuff; Comm. Ramos; Chris Sellers-Hegg versus Belden Wire and Cable; Comm. Blackburn, 10 eventually --11 COMM. BLACKBURN: Oh, I'll take that. 12 13 CHAIRMAN CARTER: -- Irene Tillman versus Indianapolis Housing Agency; Comm. Garcia, 14 Robert Brown versus Azteca Milling; and 15 16 Comm. Baynard, Breanne Johnson versus J.C. Penney's Corporation. 17 Now if we could come back to 18 Comm. Blackburn's cases. 19 20 COMM. BLACKBURN: Thank you. In the case of Hermelinda Salas De Romo 21

versus Kinro Manufacturing, Inc., I want to

uphold the finding of no probable cause.

RAMOS: Aye. 8 9 COMM. GIDNEY: Aye. CHAIRMAN CARTER: Any opposed? 10 (No response.) 11 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you. 12 And thus we come to the Administrative 13 Update and the Director's Report. We have a copy 14 of the report. 15 MR. SMITH: Yes. First I want to 16 make sure everyone got a copy. If you did not, 17 we'll make sure we get you one. 18 19 Kind of a side note, put a kickstand up, in the spirit of -- I don't know -- tradition, if 20 you will, I want to entertain the idea that we 21 kind of shut this thing off in half and pull 22

what, in essence, is that podium up, because I

think as we and the staff and whomever comes in to testify or present to you guys as a Commission should do so formally. And one, I think that's way far away; secondly, we never use that side of these tables and they're unnecessary, and in the off chance that we do have more of an audience --I know it's rare, but in the off chance that we do -- we have an opportunity to have more seating, if that's the case. So, I want to toss that out to you guys as a Commission. I know that's not like --COMM. BLACKBURN: We completely --MR. SMITH: -- earth shattering, but --COMM. BLACKBURN: -- agree with you. CHAIRMAN CARTER: Yeah. COMM. BLACKBURN: We just don't set up the room. MR. SMITH: I gotcha, and I've been thinking about it for a while, and what really got me was when we had the family and the guy that -- the Asian family that was coming to

testify, and he walked all of the way up, which

was a bit uncomfortable, if you will. And one of the reasons I think that was -- he was able to do so, he and his wife were able to do, was because of the way the room was set up. So, I would like to alleviate that. I know, again, that has nothing to do with us here --

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Yeah.

MR. SMITH: -- but I think that before we just arbitrarily did so, I wanted to present it to you guys as a Commission.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Years ago there was a rather large number of staff people who would come to the meetings, for whatever reason, and we would fill up these side tables --

MR. SMITH: Uh-huh.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: -- but there was still nobody back there.

MR. SMITH: Yeah. Well, I don't think we have a need to bring a ton of staff, outside of the folks that usually come, and we probably even need to revisit the idea of whether we need all of us here anyway, but I do want to make sure that we address that piece and make

that change, if that's okay with the Commission.

COMM. BLACKBURN: That would be terrific.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: That's fine.

MR. SMITH: Moving on to the report,

nothing huge. I would like to bring to you guys' attention, as we mentioned a few Commission meetings ago, we -- we applied for and won the HUD partnership agreement, which allocated about a quarter of a million dollars for us to do some outreach and advertising.

We broke that up into quarters because that's how HUD's going to pay us, in quarters, and so we broke the state up into quarters as well, the first of which was the southern piece of the state, and for those of you guys who are down in that piece, you may have seen some increased advertising. We've got a couple of billboards, there should be some radio spots occasionally heard. We also invested in public transportation, so on the bus stops and the side of the buses, there should be some ICRC paraphernalia, if you will, that you'll see.

The next phase will be -- Phase 2 will be the central part of the state minus Marion

County, if you will, so it's like -- it's central west and central east. The third phase will be the northern part of the state, and then fourth -- correct me if I'm wrong, Brad -- will be Marion County, in and of itself, which we'll his a little harder.

So, I bring that up because, number one, you know, if you guys see it, we want to get your opinions and thoughts of how it looks and how we are representing you guys as a Commission and the ICRC as a whole.

But then secondly, and one thing that I want to keep on your radar, in light of a lot of the local commissions which we reached out to, a lot of them may have some issues with the fact that we're advertising and promoting the agency, none of which have come to me and said anything yet, but trust me, I hear it in the wind.

And considering that you guys are out in the communities as business owners and community folks, I don't want you to get blindsided with

that, and if there's any reason why -- or if we need to sit down and have that conversation again, trust me, we are more than willing and able to do so. So, I just want you guys to be prepared for that piece as Commissioners.

Outside of that, things are going well.

We're doing a lot of outreach. One of the big

pieces that's coming up is the Fort Wayne Burmese

outreach component that we're going to be doing

here soon. The idea is to bring other state

agencies with us in tandem so that we go up and

hopefully provide some resources and information

to some folks that we're going to have it.

And we're going to do that in their community. You know, like I mentioned before, there's about five apartment complexes that are concentrated with Burmese, and so we're going to go up there and do that presentation at -- well, actually, I think we kind of got detoured with that, but we're going to go up to their communities and present it to them on their turf, instead of bringing them here or to some formal government-laden event.

so, hopefully it goes well. We've teamed up with the Burmese Advocacy Center there locally. A young lady by the name of Minn heads that piece. She's been fantastic. She's been kind of our conduit into the community, providing us with a lot of good information and resources, and hopefully we tap into that and are able to be helpful to those folks.

And that's about it, unless you guys have any questions for me.

(No response.)

MR. SMITH: Thank you.

COMM. BLACKBURN: Are you getting reaction from the on-line presence that we have now?

MR. SMITH: We get a lot of candid feedback. Oh, I guess I should also mention we're doing, you know, kind of a -- thanks to Brad, we -- kind of an introduction to the staff, if you will, and so there's this piece that goes out, in addition to the newsletter we send out, which we do get some feedback on. A lot of people consider it helpful. They like the look

of it, they like the consistent info that we send out.

But one of the ideas was that, you know, a lot of folks don't know not just who we are as an agency, but, you know, who works for the ICRC? So, we do kind of this monthly piece where staff do staff testimony of, you know, who you are, what you do for the agency, and then your take on why it's important, and some other questions related to ICRC stuff.

And it goes over pretty well, because a lot of the staff -- it's fun. You know, it's -- from a personnel standpoint, it's good to get away. Not everybody's comfortable in front of the camera, but it's a break in the monotony and an opportunity for folks to meet them who they don't normally get a chance to see. So -- but we do get a lot of positive feedback and it's going well, but always open to any suggestions of how we can improve that piece. If you guys have any thoughts and suggestions and stuff, just shoot it to us.

COMM. RAMOS: Have you done any of

those videos -- we're seeing it in other languages, like getting Danny to do those things in Spanish, or for the Burmese people, to do some in Burmese?

MR. SMITH: We do -- those videos, the staff videos, we have not, but we have shot plenty, having Danny do some, especially a lot of the PSA's we do. We've shot a good number of those in Spanish. The Hispanic community is one that we are specifically targeting by way of some of the grant money that we got, as well as our partnership with IUCEA.

So, we do specifically do, when we target the community, PSA's in Spanish, and we have Danny shoot a few, and because, again, remember, we kind of -- we've absorbed all of the cultural commissions, anything ISHLA related, the Hispanic Commission, we kind of funnel that in through the ICRC as well, as we would the Social Status of Black Males, and as we would the Women's Commission, and so on and so forth. So, yes.

COMM. RAMOS: Good.

MR. SMITH: Any other questions for

me?

COMM. BLACKBURN: What's going on with MLK for --

MR. SMITH: MLK. So, we are obviously in the planning process for that. The plan, if you will, for MLK so far is to -- I don't know if you guys are familiar, but there's a traveling exhibit, Expo had it here, and it's sponsored by Chase, J.P. Morgan, and it's traveling all over the country, and it highlights the MLK, or King and a lot of that history.

There's three pieces to the exhibit, kind of like a small, medium and large, if you will, and so the idea was to bring that in, the traveling exhibit, back here to Indianapolis as part of the MLK celebration and have that here, still have the piece at the museum where we have all of the young people come, transport them over.

The formula has worked. Over the last couple of years we've got a lot of good feedback, and so we don't want to break the formula, but we did want to change. Instead of investing a lot

into some keynote speaker who may or may not be from here, we wanted to invest in that traveling exhibit to highlight MLK, and then perhaps have a speaker come as well, but maybe someone local.

So, it's still in the works. The game plan is to still have it that week prior to the MLK holiday. That Thursday, I think, is what we normally do it on; is that right, Brad.

MR. MEADOWS: (Nodded head yes.)

MR. SMITH: And let it flow. So, we're excited about it. It's a little change in the way we have done, and plus, that exhibit is a new feature that hadn't normally been available. So, again, we heard a lot of good stuff about it when it was here for Expo, but that wasn't necessarily the MLK element, that was just African-American, you know, here for that.

But, you know, with the focus on MLK, we think it'd go over well, and we're going to set it up in the Statehouse. And by way of renting the thing, if you will, it has to stay open for a couple of days, which, from our standpoint, it turns out to be a good thing.

COMM. BLACKBURN: Okay. 1 COMM. RAMOS: Is Chase going to 2 sponsor it? 3 MR. SMITH: Yeah. Well, they sponsor 4 the exhibit all of the way around. 5 COMM. RAMOS: So, there's no cost? 6 MR. SMITH: No. I mean I'm sure 7 there will be some cost for us, but, you know, 8 the normal cost, if you will, we don't eat 9 because they've sponsored the deal nationally. 10 11 So, we're still working out the details in terms of what that will cost us, but it will be nowhere 12 near what we'd have to pay if we were putting the 13 14 thing on ourselves. So, all we have to do is bid to have it --15 to have it here, you know, put our dibs in, 16 because obviously, especially around MLK holiday, 17 we're certainly not the only ones vying for this 18 thing, so, you know, we're trying to position 19 ourselves to be the attractive destination, if 20 you will, for it to come. 21
