Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra and Ensemble Music Society of Indianapolis partner for State Library exhibit



The Indianapolis Symphony
Orchestra and Ensemble Music
Society of Indianapolis have
partnered to present a joint exhibit
at the Indiana State Library. "Over
Eight Decades of Classical Music,
featuring Women of the
Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra
and The Ensemble Music Society in
Images and Words" will be on
display until June 30.

"Women of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra" documents the impact of women on the organization's nearly 100-year history. The pièce de résistance of the exhibit is the 1968 symphony gown, designed by famed American fashion designer Norman Norell and worn by the women of the orchestra between 1969 and 1979. The gown inspired the exhibit theme. Centered around the dress and its symbolic importance to the symphony's history, the remainder of the exhibit features female musicians, composers, staff and more from each decade of the orchestra's history.

The Ensemble Music Society was formed in the winter of 1944 by a nucleus of civic-minded music

Nanabozho



The character of Nanabozho - also known or spelled as Nanabush, Nanaboozhoo or Nan Bo Shoo - is a common spirit which features prominently in the storytelling traditions of the Anishinaabe and Neshnabék. A trickster figure and cultural hero, Nanabozho is often a shape-changer who can turn into animals as well as people. This role of trickster is often used to highlight the issues that Native American people have faced throughout their history. It's also a common way that useful information and life lessons were conveyed to the youth.

Though many different stories surrounding Nanabozho exist, a particularly interesting one, "The Acts and Character of Nan Bo Shoo," deals with a version of the antediluvial creation myth. The title of this manuscript - and the way that Nanabozho's name is misconstrued throughout its entirety as "Nan bo shoo" - is an incorrect transliteration from the author who was taking down the story, Col. Abel C. Pepper. The issue of transliteration mistakes is common throughout many works done by non-native speakers when trying to gather stories. Pepper himself is notorious as the superintendent of the program which saw the removal of most of the Native Americans from Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, at the behest of Andrew Jackson.
